

I. The National Idea for Canadians: "The Northern Crucible of Innovation and Shared Stewardship"

- **Core Tenets:**

- **Connection to Borealis:** Project Borealis becomes a flagship initiative embodying this national idea – a testament to innovation in a challenging environment, a commitment to Indigenous partnership and economic inclusion in the North, and a strategic development of resources with an eye towards long-term sustainability.

II. Plan for Social-Economic and Cultural Development:

A. Transition Period (Now to Borealis Infrastructure & Initial Industrialization):
